ONE OF THE FAIR'S FLAGSHIP TREASURES

One of the last surviving and most historically significant Union Jacks from the Battle of Trafalgar At £,450,000, it is also one of the most valuable Union Jacks to come on the market

Worn by *Royal Sovereign*, which led the British attack on 21st October 1805, this flag is the most historically significant of the three surviving Union Jacks from the Napoleonic Wars, and the only example from a first rate 100-gun flagship. The banner is also the only surviving Union flag from a command ship with the flag from *HMS Victory* having been famously shredded by distraught seamen at Nelson's funeral in January 1806. Its appearance on the market 220 years after the British victory over the allied French-Spanish naval forces could trigger interest from collectors or enthusiasts from around the world.

DISCOVERY: An Imperial clock by Carl Fabergé, last publicly shown in 1902

Made in St. Petersburg, 1896-1902, this elaborately enamelled clock belonged to the Grand Duchess Maria Georgievna, Princess of Greece and Denmark, daughter of King George I of Greece and first cousin of Emperor Nicholas II.


An exceptional 'Royal' games compendium inlaid with the personal cypher of King Edward VII



George Harris (1949-1982) aka 'Hibiscus' was an American actor and performance artist who created the psychedelic gay liberation theatre group, The Cockettes. He was also the subject of one of the most celebrated moments in the 1960's when he was photographed placing a flower in a guardsman's gun in an anti-Vietnam march in 1967. The photograph is considered one of the most famous images of the 'flower power' generation.

This portrait was drawn in 1966 – the year when Harris appeared in an off-Broadway production of *Peace Creeps* alongside Al Pacino and James Earl Jones.



This wardrobe was a special and likely very expensive piece of furniture for a lucky child. A similar piece, also made by Edmund Joy and dated 1712, is part of the V&A collection. The façades of both houses bear a considerable resemblance to Kew Palace in West London, a building formerly known as 'The Dutch House'.



Taking inspiration directly from nature, the London-based female artist press-moulds hundreds of individual leaves and flower heads which she then applies to a base shape hand thrown on a potter's wheel. These leaves and flower heads are applied so densely that the base shape is entirely covered, imitating how a multitude of leaves has the ability to completely obscure the branch of a tree.



French Illustrator Maurice Leroy is well-known for his illustrations in books, satirical magazines and posters. His colourful modernist paintings pre-dating the roaring Art Deco movement are extremely rare. In the present example, the blooming flowers of spring symbolise the hope and new beginnings that came after the First World War.

Coade (1733–1821) was a pioneering entrepreneur and one of the most remarkable figures in Georgian Britain. At a time when women were rarely afforded positions of authority in business or the arts, Coade built an enduring legacy. She perfected and popularised a form of artificial stone that was renowned for its durability, and resistance detail weathering—qualities that have ensured the survival of her work for over two centuries.

A rare example of Hepworth working in gold, this sculpture is solid 18-carat gold, with gold 'strings'. This was the artist's edition of the work, which she kept until her death. The title references an uninhabited rocky island, part of the Isles of Scilly which she periodically visited from her home in St Ives. This work, like many of Barbara Hepworth's late stringed sculptures, invokes a celestial reference to the sun and the moon, a theme which she began exploring in 1966.




